Welcome to Two Rivers Parish, a partnership of Christ Community Lutheran and St. Michael Lutheran! It is a joy to worship with you on this day.

We believe God invites you to the table. Holy Communion is for all the baptized, regardless of age. If walking is difficult for you, we will bring the Lord's Supper to your seat. If you are not communing, we still invite you to come up for a blessing.

We believe worship should be accessible for all. Standing and kneeling happen throughout the worship service, which can be difficult for some. Rest assured that you are still worshipping fully with the community when you sit through these parts.

We believe children belong in worship. Children's worship kits and instructions are available in the hallway so kids can take part in worship. If a child becomes restless, it's okay, because that's what kids do. If you feel you need to take your child out of the service for a cooldown, we encourage them to return to worship as soon as they are ready.

We believe God calls us to pray as a community. Prayer requests may be made during the week by calling or emailing the church office. On Sundays, please write your prayer requests in the Prayer Request Book near the worship space entrance.

We believe God calls us to be welcoming to all. Being in a new place can be nerve-wracking to say the least. If you are unsure where something is or how something goes, please ask. We want you to feel welcome. Restroom facilities are located just down the hallway.

OPENING PRAYER


P: Let us pray.

READING-PSALM 25:1-10

From the beginning, darkness and light have been part of God's universe. When God creates the light, the darkness is not extinguished or cursed, but complemented. Light and darkness each have a purpose in God's salvation history. Day and night together are declared "good."

P: A reading from Psalms.

¹To you, O LORD, I lift up my soul.

- ² My God, I put my trust in you; let me not be put to shame, nor let my enemies triumph over me.
- ³ Let none who look to you be put to shame; rather let those be put to shame who are treacherous.
- ⁴ Show me your ways, O LORD, and teach me your paths.
- ⁵ Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; in you have I trusted all the day long.
- ⁶ Remember, O LORD, your compassion and love, for they are from everlasting.
- ⁷Remember not the sins of my youth and my transgressions; remember me according to your steadfast love and for the sake of your goodness, O LORD.
- ⁸ You are gracious and upright, O LORD; therefore you teach sinners in your way.
- ⁹ You lead the lowly in justice and teach the lowly your way.
- ¹⁰ All your paths, O LORD, are steadfast love and faithfulness to those who keep your covenant and your testimonies.

REFLECTION

A medieval Christian practice called Florilegia (in Latin it means "gathering flowers") is the act of gathering favorite words and phrases from a text like gathering flowers into a bouquet. In the seventh century, a monk in France named Defensor called his gathering of favorite words and phrases The Book of Sparklets. In this season we will collect sparklets! As you listen, you may underline or circle words, phrases, or whole verses that "sparkle" to you, or sketch a picture of an image you hear in the text. When the reading ends, you'll have a few moments for quiet reflection to write one of your sparklets down to share.

C: come, Lord Jesus.

P: We pray that all your people, made in your image, will be stirred to embody your presence as we prepare for the transforming embodiment of your love in the birth of Jesus . . . (pause). In your great mercy,

C: come, Lord Jesus.

P: We offer you these prayers in the name of the one who was, who is, and who is to come, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

LORD'S PRAYER

P: Lord, remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray.

C: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.
